Whiskeytown Lake: Our Community's Water Source

Whiskeytown Lake has been a vital part of our region since it was completed in 1963. Did you know the name "Whiskeytown" comes from a gold rush era settlement that was originally known for a local tavern where miners enjoyed a well-earned drink, hence the spirited name! The lake holds roughly 241,000-acre feet of water and has over 300 miles of trails for adventurers of all ages. So next time you fill a glass of water, take a moment to appreciate this historic and scenic resource right in our backyard.

Fire Preparedness Season

April is the perfect time to start thinking about fire preparation around your home and property. Creating defensible space is one of the most effective ways to protect your home. This includes clearing dry grass and brush, trimming tree branches away from structures and removing debris from roofs and gutters.

Be Emergency Ready – Display Your Address Clearly

Have you ever thought about the visibility of your address so emergency crews can easily find you? Numbers should be 6 inches high with a bold font, white numbers with a dark background or black numbers with a white background. Be sure to have smart placements, for example on a post or mailbox at the end of your driveway and visible from both directions at eye level. Make sure it is not blocked by trees, bushes or fences.

Earth Day April 22nd

Earth Day celebrated each year on April 22nd is a great reminder of the importance of protecting and preserving our environment for future generations. One of our most valuable natural resources is water and even small efforts to conserve it can make a big impact. As we head to the warmer months, now is a great time to check for leaks, adjust irrigation systems and be mindful of outdoor water use. We encourage residents to take simple steps to reduce water waste and help protect our local resources. By working together, we can keep our community clean, sustainable and well prepared for the season ahead.

⚠ Call Before You Dig: Protect Your Property and Utilities

Planning a digging project this spring? Before you start, call 811, the free national “Call Before You Dig” services. By contacting 811 at least 2 business days before digging, utility companies will mark the location of underground lines for water, sewer, gas, electric and communications on your property.

This simple step helps prevent costly damage, service disruptions and even serious injury. Whether you are installing a fence, planting trees or doing excavation work, always contact 811 first.
